

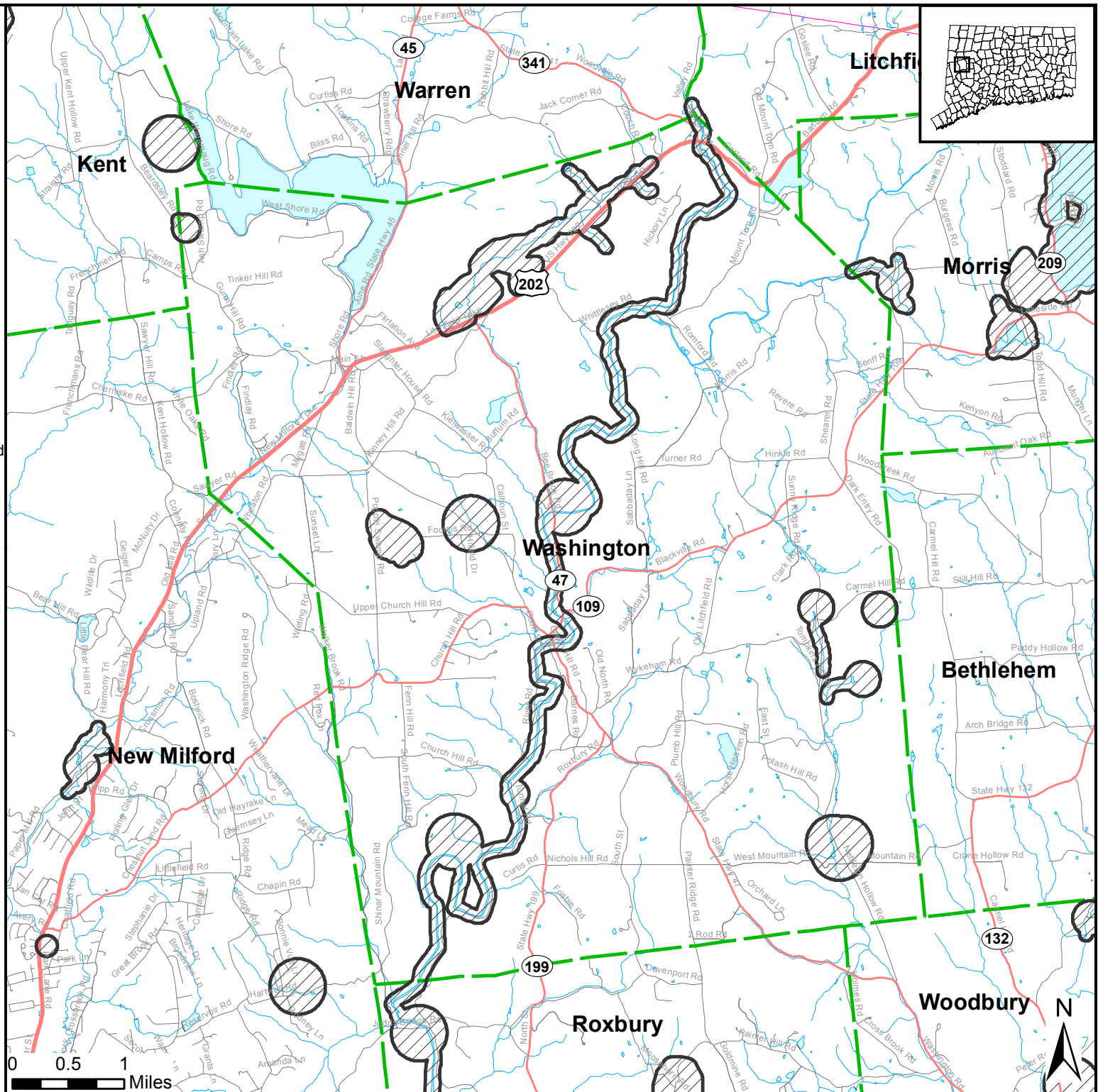

The State Historic Preservation Office is in receipt of the submitted proposal for the above-referenced project, resubmitted for review and comment pursuant to the National Historic Preservation Act and in accordance with Federal Communications Commission regulations on May 27th, 2013.

After a field reconnaissance of the proposed installation site, in addition to a balloon float and photographic simulation report, it is the opinion of this office that while the APE of the facility will overlap the Calhoun Street/Ives Road National Register of Historic Places District, the proposed 130-foot tower will only be partially visible from portions of the district year round, most prominently from the properties along the east side of Calhoun Street and Ives Road. Due to the topography and intervening vegetation, the tower appears to be partially visible seasonably from some of the other Calhoun Street/Ives Road National Register district sites.

With the introduction of the new information regarding the request to use a monopine tower and the natural screening provided in the immediate vicinity of the proposed tower with existing tall evergreen trees, it is the determination of this office that the proposed installation will have a conditional no adverse effect on cultural resources, with the following conditions:

1. the monopine tower and associated equipment will be designed, painted to match adjacent materials, and installed to be as non-visible as possible,
2. if not in use for six consecutive months, the tower and equipment shall be removed by the telecommunications facility owner. This removal shall occur within 90 days of the end of such six-month period.
