

Goal

The goal of Connecticut's Fatherhood Initiative (*Initiative*) is to promote the positive involvement and interaction of fathers with their children. The *Initiative* is a broad-based, statewide program led by the Department of Social Services that is focused on changing systems to improve fathers' ability to be fully and positively involved in the lives of their children.

Objectives

- Promote public education concerning the financial and emotional responsibilities of fatherhood;
- Assist men in preparation for the legal, financial and emotional responsibilities of fatherhood:
- Promote the establishment of paternity at childbirth;
- Encourage fathers, regardless of marital status, to foster their emotional connection to and financial support of their children;
- Establish support mechanisms for fathers in their relationship with their children, regardless of their marital and financial status; and
- Integrate state and local services available for families.

Overview of Services/Programs

The central focus of the Department of Children and Families (DCF) is to work together with families and communities to improve child safety, ensure that more children have permanent families and advance the overall well-being of children. DCF implements the Connecticut Comprehensive Outcomes Reviews (CCOR) includes components specific to examining the agency's efforts and effectiveness to serve Connecticut birth fathers giving DCF the unique ability to collect and analyze data for the purposes of informing practice and systemic enhancements. In 2008, DCF developed and implemented an Engaging Fathers in-service training curriculum available to all levels of staff. Further, DCF has implemented the Fatherhood Matters Initiative. The goal of the initiative is to promote father effective practices and includes strategies for raising awareness, developing and maintaining a birth father specific service array, and creating forums for dialogue to incorporate various stakeholder perspectives. This effort includes a focus on incarcerated fathers with children in care as well as services designed to enhance the parenting and self-sufficiency skills of adolescent fathers in the Juvenile Justice and Child Welfare systems. As the fatherhood field evolves with new and promising family centered programs, services and initiatives on the horizon, DCF will continue to integrate best practices, and form partnerships with key stakeholders including birth parents, community providers, and organizations in an effort to promote the safety, permanency, and well-being for the children and families of Connecticut.

Overview of Services/Program

The Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (DMHAS) promotes and administers comprehensive, recovery-oriented services in the areas of mental health treatment and substance abuse prevention and treatment throughout Connecticut. While the Department's prevention services serve all Connecticut citizens, its mandate is to serve adults (over 18 years of age) with psychiatric or substance use disorders, or both, who lack the financial means to obtain such services on their own. DMHAS also provides collaborative programs for individuals with special needs, such as persons with HIV/AIDS infection. people in the criminal justice system, those with problem gambling disorders, substance abusing pregnant women, persons with traumatic brain injury or hearing impairment, those with co-occurring substance abuse and mental illness, and special populations transitioning out of the Department of Children and Families. DMHAS operates on the belief that most people with mental illnesses and/or substance use disorders can and should be treated in community settings, and that inpatient treatment should be used only when absolutely necessary to meet the best interests of the patient. Effective care requires that services such as residential, supportive, rehabilitative and crisis intervention programs are available within their local communities.

The Division of Family Support Services provides a comprehensive approach to preventing child abuse and neglect to ensure the health, well-being and positive growth and development of all young children in Connecticut. The division identifies and supports the most effective means of assisting and strengthening families, communities, and human services workforce in order to prevent child abuse and neglect. To do this, staff provide training and contract for direct services to help: parents become effective caregivers and develop nurturing relationships with their children (i.e. through home visiting and creating single points of access to services in communities); communities and human service staff become more responsive to the needs of children and support their positive growth and development (i.e. truancy prevention, child development system building, provider trainings in maternal and child health, developmental screening); families find resources in time of need.

Overview of Services/Programs

The Department of Social Services (DSS) provides a broad range of services to the elderly, persons with disabilities, families, and individuals who need assistance in maintaining or achieving their full potential for self-direction, self-reliance and independent living. It administers over 90 legislatively authorized programs and one-third of the state budget. DSS administers most of its programs through offices located throughout the state. Within the department, the Bureau of Rehabilitation Services provides vocational rehabilitation services for eligible individuals with physical and mental disabilities at 23 offices throughout the state. For the other programs, services are available through 11 offices located in the three regions, with central office support located in Hartford. In addition, many services funded by the agency are available through community-based agencies. Many of the services provided by the Department are available via mail or phone call. In accordance with Public Act No. 99-193, the Department of Social Services serves as lead agency for the implementation of the John S. Martinez Fatherhood Initiative of Connecticut. DSS works with community-based partners throughout Connecticut and sponsors/participates in events that support father involvement.

Overview of Services/Programs

The Court Support Services Division (CSSD) was established in February 1999, to respond to the changing needs of judges, attorneys, litigants, defendants, and communities, while providing on-going public safety. Judges now have all available pre-trial services, family services, offender sentencing and supervision options for adults and juveniles, as well as iuvenile detention services, coordinated through the single CSSD division and managed from a central office. The CSSD established five regional service areas that closely resemble those of the Executive Branch for more efficient integration of its treatment planning and service delivery efforts with the state's human service agencies. CSSD incorporates Family Civil Services that assist the court and clients in the resolution of family and interpersonal conflicts with negotiation, mediation, and evaluation and education services in each Judicial District. Family Criminal Court services provided by CSSD's Family Services Unit include comprehensive assessment and interventions that address domestic violence cases and victim/complainants in each geographical area court site. In recognition of the distinct needs of adults and juveniles, two separate but parallel, service delivery systems were developed. CSSD Juvenile Probation provides a full continuum of monitoring, supervision and referral services for Delinguency, Judicial and Non Judicial Cases, and Families with Service Needs (FWSN) juveniles. Addresses and phone numbers for local offices can be located on the website. CSSD administers Juvenile Detention services in state run Centers that it operates in Hartford, New Haven and Bridgeport. The CSSD also administers contracts for three privately run all girls' detention centers located in Hartford, Hamden and Norwalk.

Overview of Services/Program

Fathers for Life (FFL) is a DSS-certified fatherhood program that helps noncustodial and custodial parents improve their relationship with their children. There is no fee, and no age, income or residency requirement. Programming is offered year-round, including, parenting skills (12-week, 24/7 Dad Program and the development of an individual service plan to identify and achieve parenting and other goals) and employment assistance (developing a plan for training, employment and access training scholarships and other employment resources). FFL staff also connect program participants to resources including health care, energy assistance, income tax preparation, and help with visitation, custody issues and modifying child support.

SPPT is a school-based system for pregnant and parenting teens in grades 9-12. The program focuses on improving the health, education and social outcomes for pregnant/parenting students and their children. Some of the services that are provided include flexible quality schooling, case management and family support, referrals to health services, home visiting, quality childcare for children, parenting, life skills education and support services, and father involvement services and support. SPPT services teen moms, teen dads, their children and their immediate families.
