Community-based practice settings include:

Community Health Centers

Community Health Centers (CHCs) offer one-stop shopping for patients' healthcare services, whether the need is medical, dental and/or psychosocial, regardless of ability to pay. The patients encompass all races, ages and walks of life. Community Health Centers serve over 200,000 patients and the number of patient visits has grown to over 900,000 per year.

School-Based Health Centers

School-Based Health Centers (SBHCs) are licensed by the State of Connecticut as outpatient clinics, located within or on school grounds. SBHCs may provide physical, dental and mental health services to students. All students are eligible to enroll to use SBHC services.

Local Health Departments

Local Health Departments carry out public health functions in the areas of primary and preventive healthcare, infectious disease control in the community and environmental health. Municipal health authorities and districts are also responsible for the enforcement of the state public health code.

The Rewards of Community-Based Care

Perhaps the most attractive reward for working in community-based practice settings is qualification for financial assistance through the:

- Connecticut State Loan Repayment Program
- National Health Service Corps
- Nursing Education Loan Repayment Program


