What is the CT-Vitals Electronic Death Registration System?

CT-Vitals is the Connecticut Department of Public Health's Electronic Death Registration System, a secure web-based system that will soon provide for the electronic filing of Connecticut deaths.

How does it compare to what we do now?

The CT-Vitals Electronic Death Registration system will replace Connecticut's current paper based death reporting system. The CT-Vitals Electronic Death Registration system will facilitate online collaboration of multiple death registration users, including funeral homes, hospitals, nursing homes, hospice, clinicians and medical examiners — to complete and file death records electronically to the state and local registrar offices.

Your Responsibility as a Medical Certifier

As a medical certifier, a physician, physician's assistant, a registered nurse, or an advanced practice registered nurse, you can initiate a death certificate process. You are primarily responsible for documenting the decedent's date, time, and cause(s) of death, the medical portion of the certificate, and other contributing factors of the death.

With the help of CT-Vitals, you will be able to improve the timeliness of death reporting and promote the uniformity in collection and reporting of cause-of-death and related statistics.
