DSS staff are delivering the toys and gifts to offices of the Department of Children and Families (DCF) across the state in time to have social workers bring the toys to the children in time for the holidays.

DCF Commissioner Joette Katz said the effort is a heart-warming demonstration of the caring commitment of so many state employees who dedicate themselves in their professional and private lives to assist those who need help.

DSS Commissioner Roderick L. Bremby said the toy drive marks another collaboration between the two agencies, which also work together on mental health, substance abuse, housing and other services.

"DSS staff across the state have enthusiastically joined our colleagues at DCF in this very special toy drive," said Commissioner Bremby. "The generous response by our two agencies' employees and their families will help make the holidays as cheerful as possible for so many children. We're very proud of the compassionate spirit of state employees who care for children, families and older adults as their profession, and also go above and beyond in so many ways."

Both state agencies also thanked employees from KPMG who gave generously to the drive as well.

Toys were delivered Friday to Milford and Monday to Hartford. Other offices have received or will receive the donations by the end of this week.

Others are helping to assemble toys. For example, later this week, the automotive students from Kaynor Technical High School will be assembling donated bicycles so they can be provided to children in foster care being served by the Waterbury DCF office.
